





### Mr. Fred Wolf, Principal





The senior class has most decidedly been a credit to itself; to its advisers; and to the school as a whole.






# Girls' League

At the beginning of the school year a hard times party was presented to initiate the new members into the club





This spring, the Double Trio gave a concert program, with Nellie Pearmine and Margaret Wonderlick




No-Name league Jayvee teams, small Willamette Valley high school teams, and city church teams provided competition for the "Baby" Vikings.




#### Wrestling

As only one champion, Ray Wilson, had returned from last year's team, little had been expected of the grapplers. Expert guidance from Coach Vern Gilmore, however, plus help from former wrestlers, aided the Vikings in becoming the top team of the state.



#### Boxing

Since they had the handicap of an incomplete schedule and no regular coach, little was expected of the Viking boxers this year.

After losing the only regular season matches to Lebanon 8-4 and 8-6, the Viking punchers improved rapidly, cinched the district title by defeating Chemawa, and sent seven men to the state tournament. 


#### Swimming


