Whether it be Bombay or Salem, there are former students of Miss Holt applying the lessons she taught. The joy of the future rests for her in the kind deeds of the past.









AFS also sends American teenagers abroad to live with families and attend school for two to five months.

The American Field Service was founded in 1914 as a volunteer ambulance corps and served with the allied forces in both World War I and World War II. Its 4,000 volunteer members carried over a million casualties. The AFS peacetime program of international exchange on the teenage level was founded in 1947; the Summer Program in 1950 and the School Program in 1957."






One of the most important things for a journalist to do, is to listen to the editor.




The music is sung with feeling.


From these 'polyphonic' pupils come the tunes that go to make up the musical entertainment represented by the band, orchestra, pep-band, and glee clubs.

Thanks to the tireless efforts of Mr. Russell Wittmer, our band is a proud possession of our school.




The Spanish Club meetings are always punctuated with interesting talks by the students themselves, on some point of interest about the Spanish speaking countries of the world.








The Viks took the kickoff from South and marched down the field in 17 plays to win the ballgame in its final seconds.



A lot of enthusiasm was twisted out of the body at this year's matches, but it was generally that of the opponents. Thanks for a good year, Coach Johnsrud!




Batter Up! Lets play




